Paint or no Paint?

It's time to Paint!

Get out the paint cans and spray nozzles, Coharie is painting their greens this fall. The decision was made by Dickie Walters and Randy Folger after consulting with Dr. Leon Lucas, Carolinas Golf Association's Agronomist, and asking members what they would like to see this year. Over-seeding in past years has been extremely difficult to manage and the end result has been somewhat disappointing. Over-seeding the greens for winter is a time consuming and expensive process. When you over-seed with poa annua and rye, you are hoping that the seed will "take" and grow during the winter months. Countless man hours are spent watering, fertiliz-

ing, cutting, and re-seeding with the desire of achieving a consistent, uniform putting surface. During this two month transition period, members are forced to play on wet, slow, and sandy greens while the seed germinates. (Painting continued on page 2)



Paint or no Paint?

When spring arrives, the poa annua and rye must be sprayed out or “killed” so the Bermuda grass can grow again. When compared to high costs of over-seeding, painting of golf course greens can potentially save significant dollars that can be applied in other areas of required maintenance. There are many benefits to painting. First, painting protects the Bermuda grass from cold, harsh winters. The paint acts as a protective barrier for the grass. The paint protects the roots by absorbing sunlight, making the soil temperatures higher than on over-seeded surfaces. Second, the paint used for painting golf course greens contains small amounts of ammonia, which breaks down into nitrogen, a natural fertilizer for grass. Third, the quality of the putting surface is more consistent. Painting makes it easier to read the putts when it’s green than when it’s brown. Areas on greens that fail to germinate can lead to inconsistent putting speeds.

Finally, the spring transition is easier. There is no competition between cool and warm season grasses. If pesticides or herbicides are needed in late winter or early spring, you can spray without the fear of hurting the over-seeded areas. One pre-caution to painting is that holes with moderate slopes can become faster than normal. Dr. Lucas warned holes 1, 2, 9, 11, and 17 may have limited hole locations due to their slopes. To offset the speed, Dr. Lucas suggested Randy raise the mower heights on these greens before painting. Mower heights will be raised starting the last week of September. In addition the greens will be sanded one last time to make sure the putting surfaces are smooth. If all goes well, we hope to paint the greens starting the week of October 18th 2010.
